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Rebuilding Kingdom Consciousness: Identity and Spiritual Geography

Session Summary

The first session of *Rebuilding Kingdom Consciousness* established a foundational principle that would shape the rest of the series:

Identity precedes dominion.

Before discussing influence, leadership, governance, resources, or stewardship, participants were challenged to answer a more fundamental question:

What Is Man?

The teaching argued that God's formation of man was not merely a design exercise; it was a jurisdictional strategy.

According to Genesis 2:7, God formed man from two distinct elements:

- Dust from the earth
- The breath of life from God

The dust component gave man legitimacy within the earth realm. The breath of God gave man legitimacy within the spiritual realm.

As a result, man became a unique being capable of functioning in both dimensions simultaneously.

This dual composition was presented as the basis for man's authority and responsibility. Unlike spirits, who do not possess natural jurisdiction within the earth realm, humanity was specifically designed to operate across both realms.

This understanding has profound implications for prayer, stewardship, and dominion.

The Blueprint for Human Flourishing

The session examined Luke 18:1 and Matthew 4:4 to establish that man was not designed to function independently of God.

Prayer is not merely a Christian discipline. It is part of humanity's original design.

Likewise, hearing from God is not optional for believers who desire to function according to divine intent.

The teaching emphasized that man cannot function optimally without regular interaction with the spirit realm.

One statement particularly resonated throughout the room:

"If you are not at the table of men, you are probably on the menu."

The implication was clear: believers are not called merely to survive within systems. They are called to influence, shape, and steward them.

Prayer, Judgement, and Enforcement

One of the most significant ideas presented during the session concerned the relationship between prayer and earthly outcomes.

When believers pray, God releases judgement from the heavenly realm.

However, receiving judgement is only the beginning.

The responsibility of man is to enforce that judgement within the earth.

In other words, prayer is not simply about receiving answers. It is about partnering with God to translate heavenly realities into earthly outcomes.

This framework was presented as one of the reasons why God formed man with jurisdiction in both realms.

Ownership Before Possession

The discussion on faith introduced an important distinction between ownership and possession.

Participants were challenged to consider that in the Kingdom of God, ownership often precedes possession.

Faith allows believers to come into ownership of a reality before it becomes visible or physically manifested.

Possession is simply the eventual manifestation of something already secured through faith.

The teaching contrasted this with corruption, which seeks possession without legitimate ownership.

This principle was applied not only to spiritual matters but also to leadership, influence, resources, and marketplace engagement.

Dominion and the Courts of Heaven

The session introduced the idea that believers who desire to exercise dominion in society must understand how divine justice and spiritual legal systems operate.

The Kingdom functions through principles of legitimacy, authority, jurisdiction, and judgement.

Dominion therefore is not merely about exerting power. It involves understanding the legal framework through which God governs creation.

This becomes particularly important for believers seeking influence within business, governance, institutions, and culture.

The Legal Framework of Dominion

The teaching presented four interconnected concepts:

Jurisdiction

Jurisdiction is the first requirement for dominion.

A person cannot legitimately exercise authority within a territory where they have no legal right to operate.

Infrastructure

Once jurisdiction is established, infrastructure becomes necessary.

Infrastructure includes systems, institutions, structures, relationships, and mechanisms that sustain influence over time.

Dominion without infrastructure is temporary.

Language

Language was described as the tool through which infrastructure is built.

One of the most significant statements from the session was:

The primary purpose of words is not communication. It is creation.

God created through speech. Humanity, as a speaking spirit, participates in creation through words.

Dominion

Dominion emerges when jurisdiction, infrastructure, and language work together to establish God's purposes within a territory.

Hearing and Speaking

The teaching argued that hearing is embedded into creation itself.

God designed creation to respond to sound.

Because everything can hear, words possess the ability to create change.

This concept was connected to Jesus' teachings about speaking to mountains and His declaration that even the dead can hear the voice of God.

The session therefore presented speech as more than communication – it is a spiritual mechanism through which realities are established.

Sound Creates Light. Light Determines Time.

A major framework introduced during the session was the relationship between sound, light, and time.

Sound Creates Light

Genesis records that God spoke before light appeared.

The teaching therefore proposed that sound precedes illumination.

Words create light.

Words introduce understanding.

Words create order within chaos.

Light Determines Time

Genesis further reveals that light governs day and night.

The teaching proposed that the intensity of light determines time.

Greater light accelerates understanding, movement, and progress.

This principle was illustrated through the story of Lazarus.

When Jesus arrived at Lazarus' tomb, those present believed He had come too late.

Jesus demonstrated that divine light operates above natural timelines.

As Mr. Okunsanya explained:

Resurrection is not an event. It is a person.

The Altar as a Place of Negotiation

The session also introduced the concept of the altar.

The altar was described as a meeting point between spiritual and physical realities.

It is a place where authority is negotiated.

A place where power is exchanged.

A place where spiritual transactions affect earthly outcomes.

Throughout Scripture, altars function as points of interaction between heaven and earth, making them central to understanding dominion and spiritual geography.

Sacred Spaces and God's Redemptive Strategy

The second half of the session examined God's pattern of operating through sacred spaces.

Examples included:

- Abraham
- Israel
- Jesus Christ
- The Church

The teaching suggested that throughout history, God has consistently reserved people, places, and communities through which He advances His purposes.

Even when entire cultures move away from God, He preserves consecrated spaces from which redemption can flow outward.

Participants were encouraged to consider how God may be calling them to steward such spaces within their families, communities, professions, and institutions.

The Language of Spirits

The session concluded with an introduction to what was termed "The Languages of Dominion."

Particular attention was given to the language of spirits.

Participants were reminded that spirits do not communicate through English or earthly vocabulary.

They communicate through spiritual realities.

Jesus affirmed this principle when He declared:

"The words that I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life."

Within this framework, spirits respond to realities such as:

- Covenant
- Sacrifice
- Legality
- Authority
- Sound

Understanding these spiritual languages becomes essential for believers seeking to operate effectively within God's Kingdom.

A Generational Perspective

The session ended with an important reminder about God's larger agenda.

God's purposes often span generations and centuries.

Many biblical figures laboured for outcomes they never personally witnessed.

The measure of success is therefore not whether we see the final result in our lifetime, but whether we faithfully fulfil the assignment entrusted to us.

Kingdom consciousness requires the humility to recognise that we are contributors to a story much larger than ourselves.
